Challenges in Implementing Direct Primary Care

It's Not All Cupcakes and Cookies

- · Legal and Regulatory Compliance
 - Varying state laws and regulations can be unclear or conflicting.
 - Ensuring compliance requires careful navigation of the legal landscape.
- Sustainable Financial Model
 - · Establishing enough membership to cover operational costs is challenging, especially in competitive markets.
 - Reduces reliance on insurance but requires a robust financial strategy.
- Patient Education and Acceptance
 - Requires effective communication and outreach to demonstrate benefits over traditional insurance-based models.
 - Potential hesitancy from individuals familiar with insurance models leading to misconceptions.
- Physician Recruitment and Retention
 - Needs providers aligned with patient-centric care philosophy.
 - Limited talent pool due to specific skill and philosophy alignment requirements.
- Overcoming these challenges is crucial for the successful establishment and growth of DPC practice.
