

- Black MMR 67.5/100K
- White MMR 21.2/100K
- Black women = 8% of OK Births
- Black women = 17% of OK Maternal Deaths

Maternal Mortality

- 3X higher MMR for Black Women
- 2.8X higher MMR for NA Women
- 80% preventable

















Internet Access Telehealth

- 48% of OK rural residents have access




Figure 1: Broadband availability rates for U.S. and Oklahoma (2017).
